What is a Program Learning Group (PLG)?

- Interagency Groups of INGOs, CBOs, academic partners, and other stakeholders
- Catalyzes on-the-ground learning
- Informs global practices and policies

Some Possible PLG Activities

- Conduct interagency program evaluations
- Pilot new research and evaluation methods
- Share learning, both locally and globally, and educate stakeholders and policy makers
- Reflect upon promising and proven practices, as well as unintended impacts
- Organize trainings, workshops and south-to-south knowledge exchanges

Why PLGs?

- Get local, culturally-grounded perspective
- Identify and prioritize learning needs
- Provide a “reflective space” for child protection practitioners

Goals of the Global Classroom Initiative

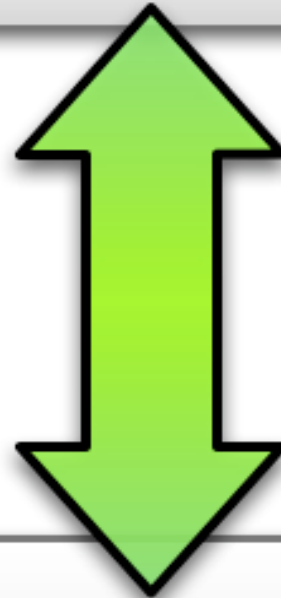
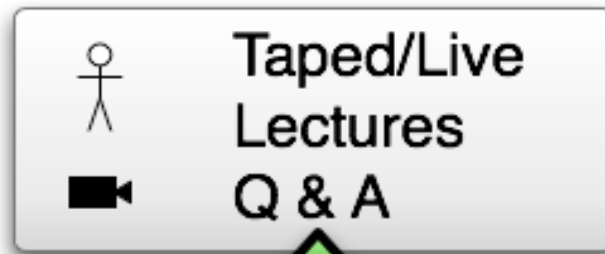
- Create real-world, cross-disciplinary courses in which people from around the world can participate
